## Tennessee Ranks 34<sup>th</sup> in Average Teacher Salaries

Washington, D.C.— Tennessee ranked 34<sup>th</sup> in the nation for its average teacher salary for the 2002-03 school year, according to the American of Teachers' annual teacher salary survey released Thursday.

Tennessee ranked 34<sup>th</sup> in the nation for its 2002-03 average teacher salary, at \$39,186, up 1.7 percent from the previous year. Tennessee ranked 25<sup>th</sup> for its average beginning teacher salary, at \$29,045, up 3.5 percent from the previous year. The AFT estimates that Tennessee's average starting salary for the most recent school year, 2003-04, was \$29,974.

Regionally, Tennessee's 34<sup>th</sup> position fell in the middle of its neighboring states. North Carolina was 23<sup>rd</sup> at \$42,411; Alabama was 33<sup>rd</sup>, at \$39,524; West Virginia was 36<sup>th</sup> at \$38,497; and Kentucky was 37<sup>th</sup>, at \$38,486.

Across the country, teachers' salaries remained relatively stagnant while their share of health benefits rose at all-time rates, making it difficult to attract and keep good teachers at a time when they are increasingly needed, the report said.

Nationally, the 2002-03 average teacher salary, which is the most recent figures available, was \$45,771 up 3.3 percent from the previous year, and the average beginning teacher salary was \$29,564, up 3.2 percent from the year before. But AFT's report noted that teachers' share of health insurance costs spiked an average 13 percent, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

"Exorbitant health insurance costs are taking an intolerable bite out of already inadequate teacher salaries. Teachers are being asked to do more, shortages persist in the most challenging areas to teach, yet compensation packages are insulting," said AFT Secretary-Treasurer Edward J. McElroy.

Furthermore, the AFT noted, superintendents' average salaries are as much as four times higher than teachers' average pay. "States and school districts are crying poverty when it comes to teachers' pay yet somehow find money for extravagant administrator salaries," McElroy said.

California led the nation with the highest average teacher salary for 2002-03, at \$55,693. South Dakota had the nation's lowest average teacher salary, at \$32,414. Alaska led the nation with the highest average beginning teacher salary for 2002-03, at \$37,401. Montana had the nation's lowest average beginning teacher salary, at \$23,052.
